

## Real Estate Bullets #9:

## Lowering Bond Approval Threshold

<u>Assembly member Cecilia Aguiar-Curry</u> is striving to utilize ACA 1 to **amend the state constitution**, aiming to reduce the necessary vote share for <u>bond approval to 55%</u>.

- ACA 1 **lowers the voter approval threshold** from a two-thirds supermajority to 55% majority.
- The lowered threshold applies to <u>local GO bonds</u> and **specific special taxes** for affordable housing, public infrastructure, and permanent supportive housing projects.
- Some recent housing proposals have **failed to pass** due to falling short of the two-thirds threshold.
- Examples include a \$650 million bond measure in Berkeley (59% approval), a \$900 million housing bond in San Diego (58% approval), and multi-million dollar housing bonds in San Jose (64% approval), Santa Rosa (62% approval), and Santa Cruz County (over 55% approval).
- <u>Supported by</u>: new Assembly speaker Robert Rivas, housing advocates, developers, unions, and local governments.
- Opposed by: business groups concerned about easier tax hikes and potential weakening of Proposition 13, which caps local taxation.
- The proposed amendment requires passage in the Legislature with a **two-thirds vote**.
- If successful, it will be on the November 2024 ballot.
